This lesson plan for school years 1 to 3, assists students in creating their own book, focusing on the fundamental resources needed to keep cats happy and healthy. It is recommended that the activity "Cat Needs Bag", is played prior to this lesson. The download includes book template "My Cat Needs".

Lesson Plan: Cat Needs Booklet

Introduction


- Following on from the activity "Cat Needs Bag" have a discussion with students around the resource's cats need to stay happy and healthy.
- Discuss what are some of the favourite things their cats like to do or eat.

Activity

- Introduce students to the booklet template.
- Explain to the students that you will be using the booklet to illustrate all the resources their cats need to be happy and healthy.
- Ensure students have the correct materials to conduct the lesson e.g. pencils, pens, crayons etc.
- To assist students, place ideas under each heading in the booklet on the board.
- EXAMPLE: Ideas to support students' illustrations could include under the page topic "Good Food"- Bone, Dog Food, Meat, Vegetables.
- Once students have completed their booklets, have them displayed in the classroom for reading time or in the school library.
- Cat Needs Booklets can also be used for Buddy Reading with other classes.






